Outcomes:

EN5-RVL-01: uses a range of personal, creative and critical strategies to interpret complex texts

EN5-URA-01: analyses how meaning is created through the use and interpretation of increasingly complex language forms, features and structures

EN5-URB-01: evaluates how texts represent ideas and experiences, and how they can affirm or challenge values and attitudes

Task Description:

Guiding Question

How do composers of texts purposefully create meaningful connections between a concept and an audience?

Part A - Visual Representation

Create a visual representation of your suite of themed poetry studied in class. Your visual representation should be:

- Using any media of your choice (painting, weaving, modeling, drawing etc)
- Be a physically or digitally complete representation
- Can be composed at home (prior to assessment week)
- Represent **at least three** different poems from your suite of themed poetry.

Part B - Presentation (in assessment week)

Present a multi-modal product that justifies your creative choices in constructing your visual representation. Your multimodal presentation should include:

- A set of slides **OR** physical representation for in-class presentation **OR** a recorded voice-over of constructed slides **OR** a video presentation of your creative choices
- At least one section of annotated poetry demonstrating your understanding of the theme
- Images of your visual representation and how it articulates your understanding of the theme.

Your presentation should be no longer than three minutes.

Part C - Personal Reflection (in assessment week)

Write a short personal reflection that evaluates the effectiveness of your visual representation. This should include:

- Your opinion on the successes and challenges of your response to the themed poetry
- Reference (quotations) to at least three poems from your study during the module
- Answer the question: "If you could make one improvement that demonstrated an element of the themed poetry more effectively, what would it be?"

Your reflection should be between 250 and 300 words.
