Social and Cultural Continuity and Change in a Selected Country

Students will study in detail a country in order to:

- determine the nature of traditional society and culture
- analyse the nature of power and authority
- examine the impact of continuity and change upon the lives of individuals and groups in the micro, meso and macro levels of society.

Students will explore BOTH continuity AND change in the selected country through a detailed study of ONE of the following aspects:

- beliefs, values and lifestyles
- education
- family life and population changes
- gender roles and the status of men and women
- the legal system and political processes.

In relation to the selected country, students will examine:

- Is all change necessarily progress?
- Which groups benefit from change? Which do not?
- How has access to technologies impacted on the rate and direction of change?

Choose ONE social theory from the list below and apply it to the selected country:

- conflict
- evolutionary
- functionalist
- interactionist.

Assess the appropriateness of this social theory in explaining continuity and change for the selected country.

Questions may ask you to:

- Apply course concepts to explain continuity and change in a selected country
- Describe examples of continuity and change in a selected country
- Explain and analyse the causes and impacts of continuity and change
- Apply and/ or evaluate social theories in explaining continuity and change in a selected country
